



# 2018 FESTIVAL OF TREES ENJOYED BY 8,500 GUESTS!

Festival of Trees 2018 was an overwhelming success thanks to over 200 sponsors, 300 volunteers, and 8,500 guests who came together to kick-off the holiday season. The 29<sup>th</sup> annual three-day Festival included the Ladies Holiday Luncheon, Ugly Christmas Sweater Party, Festival of Trees Gala, Christmas Family Fun with Santa, Daddy Daughter Sugar Plum Fairy Ball and weekend-long Santa's Workshop, gift shops, tree viewing and local entertainment. Every event featured new elements to delight guests!

A new attraction this year was the gigantic Girls and Boys Toy Boxes created and stuffed full of terrific toys by APE Maintenance. The raffle tickets sales were brisk! Santa and Mrs. Claus made appearances at each event spreading holiday cheer and helped the Fairy Tale characters at Santa's Workshop and the Daddy Daughter Sugar Plum Fairy Ball.

The adults enjoyed the Ladies Holiday Luncheon and the Ugly Christmas Sweater Party leading up to the fabulous Festival of Trees Gala. At the Gala, thirty-three trees were auctioned off with heated bidding amidst laughter and cheer. The room got very quiet when the Fort Mac Hockey Bros tree hit the \$50,000 mark and then went wild when our terrific auctioneer Danny Hooper asked both parties if they could each put in that amount and share the tree! Just like that we had a record-breaking \$100,000 tree sold to Suncor and Finning Canada. Amazing result and it was just a taste of the generosity that is the hallmark of the Festival of Trees Gala.

"We are so grateful to our many sponsors, donors, ticket purchasers, guests and volunteers who supported our Festival of Trees. All of these efforts combined to raise \$640,000 after all expenses" said Jessica Lipton, Events Manager of the Health Foundation. "We are really looking forward to bringing some surprises to the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Festival of Trees which will be held November 15<sup>th</sup> to17<sup>th</sup>, 2019. Over the past 29 years, the Festival of Trees has raised over \$8.5 million (net after all expenses) for local health care, with over 30,000 volunteer hours invested by thousands of community members.



## **TELL ME MORE ABOUT THAT TREE!**

This section is new to the Winter Newsletter and gives an in depth look at a feature tree in the FOT Gala auction.

We are looking closely at the Angels Among Us Tree, created by designer Allison Flett and sponsored by CEDA. This tree was an homage to the Murdered and Missing Aboriginal Women in Canada and was both heart-stoppingly beautiful and heartrenderingly poignant.

In her interview (linked below), Allison tell us that within Indigenous culture, women have an inherent strength and sacred worth. They know what it is to bring life into this world as the ultimate test of spiritual and physical fortitude. Women nurture life, provide an unshakable foundation for families, and teach the ultimate lesson - love.

Through her hand-crafted decorations, Allison's tree expressed a longing for awareness of the mothers, aunts, sisters, nieces and friends that were taken away long before their time. She notes that the magnifying lens asks us to reflect on the topic and answer the question of why the women are missing and where they are. The tiny trees that are missing a limb force us to see how a family and community feel when a loved one is gone. The dreamcatchers seek to trap those terrible feelings of loss and despair, and the compass hopes to lead the loved ones home.

And above all, the red dress in many forms and styles is sprinkled throughout the tree to evoke the absence of the Indigenous women all across Canada.

This tree was designed for all of us to remember the angels among us. They are the diamond-like glisten in every bright white snowflake, the twinkling of lights through the holiday season and in the stars and angles on the trees. These angels' lives had great value. They were loved and cherished and are deeply missed by their loved ones and family.

This tree had great impact on the Festival of Trees guests and was purchased by Dave Tuccaro and proudly displayed at the offices of the Tuccaro Group of Companies.

Youth philanthropy is on the rise in our region and we have been very grateful for the support from individuals and school groups who are fundraising and volunteering for the Health Foundation.

Most recently guests to the Foundation office have included the Busy Bee Café volunteer team from Westwood High School, the Winter Carnival Committee from Westwood High School and representatives from the Holy Trinity High School who did a class fundraiser. We loved hearing how the fundraising was accomplished and we get really excited to hear how they are learning to support each other and their community through their good work.

We also had over 60 youth volunteers for our Festival of Trees weekend who were creating the special events that attract kids and families to festival every year. What could be more powerful than kids helping kids and giving back to the community?

We having been keeping a close eye on two youth with a passion for hockey and volunteering who really amped up their fundraising game this year in support of the Foundation. The Fort Mac Hockey Bros, Parker and Cruz Flett, started the fall with a minor campaign to Fill the Box in their backyard with new hockey equipment for kids in the outlying region who didn't have access to equipment to play the game. The idea took off when Bouchier Contracting and Finning Canada challenged each other to a hockey game in support of the boys' campaign.

When the boys entered a tree in the Health Foundation's Festival of Trees they had no idea how popular the idea would be. The tree, designed by their mother Allison Flett, featured hockey equipment and gave the purchaser the opportunity to deliver the hockey equipment to the

communities. Many FOT Gala attendees contributed to the Hockey Bros campaign with the result that the boys were able to purchase approximately \$40,000 in hockey equipment!

Tree purchasers Suncor and Finning have hosted skating parties and hockey equipment donations in Fort Chipewyan, Fort McKay, Conklin, and Anzac. Parker and Crus have attended and spoken at each event telling the kids that they just wanted them to have equipment and enjoy the game and bring funds and attention to the Health Foundation. We are very proud of everything the boys have done to bring attention to the rural communities and to the Health Foundation.

## **HONOURING AN ELDER**

## The Margaret MacDonald Medicine Wheel Room

Recently, the family and friends of the late Margaret MacDonald gathered to cut the ribbon for the re-naming of the Medicine Wheel Room located on the Continuing Care floor of the Northern Lights Regional Health Centre. This airy space has long been a place dedicated to contemplation,



spiritual renewal, and celebration. During a prayer, drumming and smudge service, the room was rededicated to honor Fort McKay elder, Margaret Marie MacDonald.

The naming of the room was made possible through the Chief and Council of the Fort McKay First Nation who wished to recognize Margaret for her outstanding contributions to Fort McKay and the larger Wood Buffalo region. She was instrumental in community development in Fort McKay and was a strong supporter of local and regional organizations, events, and charities. The naming was included as part of the Nations commitment to the Health Foundation's Gratitude Campaign.

An astute businesswoman and entrepreneur, Margaret was also the first Aboriginal member of the Northern Lights Regional Health Authority Board where she provided governance in support of health care programs and services.

Margaret's legacy of compassion and caring and supporting health programs beyond the hospital setting has endured to this day.

Alberta Health Services (AHS) recognizes facilities and services on traditional Indigenous territories and provides accessible, appropriate health services for First Nations, Metis and Inuit people in Alberta. The Margaret MacDonald Medicine Wheel at the

Northern Lights Health Centre represents the alignment and continuous interaction of the physical, emotional, mental and spiritual health for patients, residents and families in our care.

The Fort McKay First Nation also commissioned a painting for the occasion from renowned artist, and Margaret's son, Frederick R. McDonald. The painting was unveiled at the dedication ceremony. In addition, four drums were commissioned from Nicholas Giant and were dedicated to the room.

The Northern Lights Health Foundation Board of Directors and staff were on hand to pay their respects and acknowledge Margaret's contributions.

# GRATITUDE CAMPAIGN ACHIEVES LAST MILESTONE!

After three years of intensive fundraising, the Health Foundation is pleased to announce that the goals for the \$16m Gratitude Campaign have been achieved!

This massive campaign encompassed eight health projects ranging from renewal of clinics in Anzac and Conklin, and renewal of the Continuing Care ward and Multipurpose Clinic in the hospital, to the creation of a brand new ward, the family-friendly Palliative Care Suites. And included the largest project in the campaign, the creation of Minimally Invasive Surgical (MIS) Suites. There were also two major public and community health projects focused on children and youth.

Bringing the campaign to a close were the final three donors featured here.

#### **Tuccaro Group:**

Longtime community member and Aboriginal entrepreneur, Dave Tuccaro led the many branches of his company to financial success by boldly entering the site services industry and demonstrating the quality of work that could be done by a local workforce. His success spans over 30 years of creating opportunities for Aboriginal workforce and community















development. As a former member of the Northern Lights Health Foundation Board, Dave understands that there is a direct link between great health care and the future of our region and he wanted his companies to play a role in leading the region to a bright and prosperous future. The Tuccaro gift of \$250,000 was directed to the MIS Suites Project to ensure more surgeries could be done locally.

#### Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo:

The Health Foundation received a Community Capital Grant of \$400,000 to the capital construction of the MIS Suites. The Community Capital Grant is one piece of a larger Community Investment Program that the RMWB offers to ensure the growth and sustainability of the social profit agencies that are serving our region. The Capital



Grant is used to support the construction, expansion or renovation of recreational, social and cultural facilities in the region. During the Health Foundation's presentation of the MIS Suites project to Council, several Council members thanked us for highlighting this project for their review and for showcasing the opportunities for new surgical options for residents. Mayor Scott noted that "strong local health care is key to ensuring Wood Buffalo's future as a vibrant, attractive and sustainable region."

#### Suncor Energy and the Suncor Energy Foundation:

A visionary \$3,000,000 leadership gift from Suncor and



the Suncor Energy Foundation completed the fundraising for the MIS Suites project and created the opportunity to renovate and renew the hospital lobby. This exciting project will convert the 40 year old lobby to a warm, welcoming space with improved lighting, more seating, power stations for electronics, accessible washrooms and way finding. When complete the lobby will reflect our Indigenous and multicultural communities. The Suncor Heart of Health Lobby will reflect the care and compassion of the service offered by every department.
